




A solo exhibition of Paik's work will be held at Bortolami Gallery in 2026.













Working primarily with thin, matte washes of color juxtaposed with shimmering, metallic impasto, Morris' practice demonstrates a rigorous commitment to experimentation, combining seemingly disparate patterns and motifs to generate exciting new outcomes and possibilities.




































Philip Pearlstein (b.1924, Pittsburgh, PA, d. 2022, New York) lived, worked and exhibited his work in New York for nearly 70 years. His paintings, watercolors, drawings, and prints have been collected by over 70 public collections worldwide, including: MoMA, New York; the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York; National Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C.; Dallas Museum of Art, Dallas, Texas; The Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; Tate, London, United Kingdom; Nationalgalerie, Berlin; Museum Ludwig, Cologne, Germany; and the Berardo Collection Museum, Lisbon, Portugal.

Marina Rheingantz (b.1983 Araraquara, Brazil) lives and works in São Paulo, Brazil. A solo exhibition by Rheingantz is currently on view at the Musée des Beaux-Arts de Nîmes in France. 


























Mary Obering (b. 1937, Shreveport, Louisiana; d. 2022, New York) combined an interest in Minimalist compositions with materials such as egg tempera paints and gilded metallic surfaces that are associated closely with 14th century Italian painting.

Born outside of New Orleans, Obering studied painting in Denver and moved to New York City in 1971, at the urging of friends such as Donald Judd and Sol Lewitt, to pursue a career as a painter.

In the early 1970s, Obering made what she called "Drop paintings" by layering strips of painted, monochrome canvas which she she would tack to the surface of large stretched canvases. Each color would drape from the top edge of the painting like a curtain, bringing otherwise two-dimensional color relationships into three dimensional reliefs.

In the 1980s, Obering moved part-time to Puglia, Italy. She moved away from canvas and began to employ the Italian old master process of egg tempera, gold leaf on gessoed panel.

Mary Obering's works have been included in exhibitions at 1975 Whitney Biennial at the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; Museum of Fine Art, Boston; Artists Space, New York; the Wadsworth Atheneum, Hartford, Connecticut; The Denver Art Museum and Nelson Atkins Museum among others.

Her works are in the permanent collections of institutions including the Detroit Institute of Art, Michigan; Fogg Museum, Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts; The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, NY; the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, Massachusetts; Perez Art Museum, Miami, Florida; MoMA, New York; University of Michigan Museum of Art, Ann Arbor; Wadsworth Atheneum, Hartford, Connecticut; Walker Art Center, Minneapolis; Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; and Yale University Art Gallery, New Haven, CT.
