




Anne Buckwalter Conestoga Valley Farmhouse, 2023 Gouache on panel 20 x 24 inches 50.8 x 61 cm BUC036




Anne Buckwalter Three Leashes, 2023 Gouache on panel 24 x 32 inches 61 x 81.3 cm BUC040

EDIE FAKE












ektor garcia




DAVID GILBERT




JAMIL HELLU




Max Jansons Royal Flower, 2023 Oil on linen 15 x 13 inches 38.1 x 33 cm JAN086




MELISSA JOSEPH



FORREST KIRK



Forrest Kirk (b. 1975, New Orleans, LA) lives and works in Los Angeles, CA. Kirk's practice is process-based, combining Gorilla Glue with acrylic paint and other materials into multi-dimensional works that hover between abstraction and representation. His technique is both additive and subtractive. He layers materials onto the surface of the canvas and carves and scrapes away at them, creating textured passages throughout.

He received his BFA from California State University, Los Angeles in 2008 and studied at Atelier in Paris. 








Andy Mister Now & Then, 2023 Pastel on linen mounted on panel 20 x 16 inches 50.8 x 40.6 cm MIS036








Andy Mister Ditmas Spring, 2023






ANDREW POPE
