
For its seventh participation in Independent, Off Paradise is pleased to debut *Rising*, a three-person presentation of new or rarely seen works by **Sylvia Fragoso** (b. 1962), **Mitchell Charbonneau** (b. 1994), and **Maximilian Schubert** (b. 1983).

Since 1984, Fragoso has worked at NIAD Art Center in Richmond, California, a vital and progressive studio for artists with developmental disabilities. Over the past forty years, as their longest tenured artist, she has produced hundreds of delicate clay sculptures. Often tributes to the memories of her childhood home and spiritual spaces, Fragoso's mysterious towers topped with crucifixes reflect her devout Catholicism. *Rising* marks Fragoso's East Coast debut and her first time showing with the gallery.

In *Rising*, Charbonneau's metal reliefs imprint the walls with the cold, matte surface of hammered metal, evoking the dense rawness of a subterranean refuge. Molded from sections of his childhood home, these works transform concrete into richly textured metal forms. For the first time, Charbonneau debuts this series—*Foundations*—at a monumental scale in lead. With its soft, dense opaqueness, this *Foundation*, one of the artist's largest works to date, reads almost like a life-size portrait of the "sitter."

A suite of luminous "canvases" from Schubert's newest "Untitled" series offers a stark contrast. Using the old master technique of glazing—applying thin layers to build color, depth, and light—Schubert creates works made entirely from poured, translucent polyurethane. They are cast urethane resin objects—hybrids, really, of painting and sculpture that refuse to cohere into one or the other.

Rising runs May 8-11, 2025 at Independent.



Sylvia Fragoso (b. 1962) is a Bay Area artist who has been working at NIAD Art Center since 1984. For Fragoso, making art is deeply tied to family, faith, and community. Many of her ceramics, drawings, and embroideries are homages to spiritual spaces, modeled after her grandmother's home in Mexico or her family's church. A solo show of Fragoso's architectural clay structures was presented by The Good Luck Gallery, LA in 2017. More recently, her work has been featured in two-person and group exhibitions on the west coast, including those at Adams and Ollman in Portland, OR; Left Field Gallery in Los Osos, CA; the Oakland Museum of California; MarinMOCA; and Tierra Del Sol in Los Angeles, CA. In 2023, three of Fragoso's ceramic sculptures were acquired for the permanent collection of the Oakland Museum of California.





FOUNDATIONS (2023-)

Foundations is a new series of copper and aluminum reliefs of raw concrete walls, suggest a setting for this loosely theatrical mise-en-scène: an unfinished basement. To produce the metal reliefs, **Mitchell Charbonneau** makes molds from the foundation walls of his childhood home, then hammers the sheet metal (far more precisely than his work with a sledgehammer) over the molds. Subterranean, darkened, and secluded, cellars are interstitial spaces that allow our imagination to bloom. Comfortably situated within the family home, but concealed from watchful eyes, they can be sites of play but also of transgression, mystery, and fear that loom large in our memories.

By converting a base substance into metal, the *Foundations* also underscore the alchemical aspect of Charbonneau's entire project. Unlike his tables, chairs, and cans, they are more obviously transformed from one material to another. Not only does the lustrous metal elevate the status of the aesthetically unrefined wall, it also activates the scarred surface by reflecting ambient light to glimmering effect. While still rooted in casting and mold-making, these wall-mounted sculptures indicate a new, painterly direction for the artist. Each composition hinges on a seam in the concrete, which vertically divides the plane and anchors what is otherwise a formless muddle of splotchy crevices. As with all of Charbonneau's works, the humble subject matter and damaged surfaces belie the painstaking work that went into recreating something most people never think twice about.

The Foundations series demonstrates that Charbonneau's real interest may lie with metamorphoses — transformations triggered by the shift from one material to another; from manufactured product to handmade artwork; from low to high commodity; from useful object to one for contemplation. His sculptures only have to deceive enough to arouse doubt and spark a reconsideration of these quotidian objects. And if these aren't the real deal, what else is fronting as something else? Herein lies the real violence of Charbonneau's sculptures: their destabilizing force. By undermining our trust in what we see, they compel viewers not only to reckon with the objects at hand, but everything around them. They shake our very foundations.



Mitchell Charbonneau (b. 1994, Bedford, New Hampshire) received his BFA from The Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, New York in 2016. Charbonneau explores the depths of American culture through his subtle and meticulously crafted "trompe-l'oeil" cast-resin polychrome bronze sculptures. His work navigates the overlooked realms of everyday consumer objects—folding chairs, card tables, air fresheners—elevating them to subjects of Eschewing renewed consideration. Charbonneau readymade objects, reconstructs his factory-made subjects by hand, with a level of care and attentiveness that elevates them beyond utility. His debut solo show, Gone in 60 Seconds, opened at team (gallery, inc.), New York in early 2020. In the fall of that same year, Charbonneau was included in Ascensions, a group exhibition at Off Paradise, followed by two solo exhibitions with gallery, Senseless in and Foundations in 2023. Charbonneau's work is in private and corporate collections in the U.S. and Europe, including the JPMorgan Chase Art Collection. Charbonneau currently lives and works in Ridgewood, New York, and is represented by Off Paradise, New York.








Untitled (Over New York), 2024




Untitled (Over New York), 2024

Maximilian Schubert (b. 1983, Rockford, Illinois) received his BFA from The School of the Art Institute of Chicago in 2007. Schubert's work often straddles the boundaries between painting and sculpture. The luminous "canvases" that make Untitled, (2024-), his newest series, are cast urethane resin objects-hybrids of painting and sculpture that refuse to cohere into one or the other. Employing the old master technique of glazing where thin layers of paint impart color, depth and luminosity to a surface, Schubert creates works composed entirely of layer upon layer of poured, translucent polyurethane. Schubert has exhibited in the US and abroad, including two solo exhibitions at Off Paradise, New York, Doubles in 2020 and Nocturnes in 2023; And Now, Dallas; Lisson Gallery, London; the Power Station, Dallas, Texas; Bjorn/Gundorf, Aarhus, Denmark; Van Doren Waxter, New York; Kinman, London; Eli Ping/Frances Perkins, New York; Stephane Simoens, Knokke, Belgium; Bureau, New York; The Warehouse, Dallas; Chart, New York, and CCA, Andratx, Mallorca. Schubert's work is in private and corporate collections in the U.S. and Europe, including the JPMorgan Chase Art Collection. Schubert lives and works in Brooklyn, New York, and is represented by Off Paradise, New York
